

Public Health on the Go

OSDH Public Health on the Go mobile units reach some of our state's most rural areas, meeting residents where they are.

Services vary by location but may include:

- Immunizations
- Blood Pressure Checks
- WIC Services
- Adult Health Exams
- Dental Varnish
- Pregnancy Testing

Maternity Clinics

The OSDH operates maternity clinics in areas throughout Oklahoma that are identified as "maternity deserts" — meaning no maternal care is provided within 30 miles or more. Additionally, the OSDH team continues to identify partners to help fill the gap.





Pregnancy Resource Navigator Program



This innovative program provides one-on-one support to all pregnant women and newly parenting families.



Emphasizes meeting basic needs while prioritizing and promoting protective factors across generations.



Since Jan. 1, more than 2,300 pregnant and newly parenting families have engaged with the PRN program.



Choosing Childbirth

- CCB-funded organizations will provide services that empower women/parents to choose childbirth by providing information, counseling, education, and support services to assist with decision-making.
- Not-for-profit organizations can apply for grants to fund this program.

- Services may include obstetric ultrasounds, transportation, and housing assistance, home visitation model, education and employment assistance and nutritional support services.

Family Support & Prevention Services







The evidence-based home visitation model provided home visits to nearly 12,000 homes, with 946 families and 903 children served in 2023.

The OSDH Office of Communications launched the Life website to provide resources in four key areas to assist women and families in decision-making before, during, and after birth.

Family Resource Centers served more than 458 families since Aug. 2023, and the OSDH Maternal & Child Health Services programs served more than one million mothers, children, and families last year.

What We Do

Healthy Relationship & Parent Education

- Relationship workshops, resulting in increased self-awareness, better decision-making, positive communication, and conflict resolution skills.
- Parenting workshops and support groups, resulting in increased positive parenting practices and effective communication with their children.

Family Coaching & Case Management

- Support and resources to enhance coping skills and self-sufficiency, leading to improved family well-being and self-esteem.
- Connections to essential social services to improve overall well-being and family stability.

Employment Services

 Access to education and employment skill development opportunities for parents, resulting in increased employability and family income.

How We Do It

Workshops

Workshop content includes communication skills, resolving and managing conflict, problem-solving, stress, managing anger, and the benefits of a healthy relationship—offered in contextualized and culturally appropriate ways that are designed to:

- Increase constructive behaviors
- Build protective factors for families
- Reduce negative behaviors



Coaching

Coaching sessions with a dedicated Family Support Coach (FSC) are scheduled at strategic points during participation to:

- Encourage attendance and engagement
- Assess needs and barriers to participation
- Reinforce curriculum concepts and skills
- Provide linkages to local resources
- Support couples in achieving their individual and family goals

Parenthood

Baby Academy (0-3 mos.)

Baby Academy provides evidence-based information on infant care and the important role parents play in early childhood development.

After their baby is born, couples attend Baby Academy with their newborn, giving parents the opportunity to:

- Immediately apply knowledge about newborn care ands elf-care to their family life
- Observe and understand infant cues and behaviors in real-time
- Connect with other families immediately after the birth of the baby

Safety & Solids (4-12 mos.)

Safety & Solids provides evidence-based information on child development, safety practices, and nutrition.

Couples attend Safety & Solids when their baby is 4-12 months old, which is the optimal time to:

- Learn about and experience developmental milestones
- Identify common causes of and discuss ways to prevent accidental injuries
- Discuss when to introduce healthy, solid foods



How Our Program Impacts Couples & Their Families

Research Shows Couples Who Participate in Family Expectations Have:

- A happier and more stable relationship
- Better communication
- Reduced depression for new moms
- Less conflict
- More parenting skills
- And they are more likely to stay together!



Strengthening the Relationship of a New Baby's Parents Has a Lot of Positive Impacts:

- Decreasing conflict and stress in the parents' relationship assists in healthy brain development for the baby
- Baby's learning ability has been linked to the amount of time dad is around
- A stronger and healthier relationship between parents can help avoid premature labor and low birth weight
- Learning how to work better together as a team will help a baby grow in all aspects of their life!

Impacts on Baby



Baby Brain GROWTH

FE Improves Conflict Management

Being surrounded by excessive stress can derail healthy brain development of the baby, with damaging effects on learning behavior and health across the child's life span.



Baby-Father BOND

FE Increases Father Involvement

Early positive father-child interaction reduce cognitive delay.



Healthy BABY

FE Decreases Psychological & Physical Abuse

Physical and emotional abuse during a pregnancy can lead to low birth weight and even miscarriages.



Growing BABY

FE Decreases Maternal Depression

Depressed women produce higher levels of stress chemicals during pregnancy, which reduce fetal growth and are associated with an increased risk for premature labor.



Independent BABY

FE Teaches Healthy Baby Interaction

Learning baby cues, including how and when to respond, helps parents establish positive attachments with their infants and build foundations encouraging independence.




Severe Maternal Morbidity Impacts ~60,000 Annually

Infant Mortality Rates Are Highest for Babies Born to Teen Mothers & Highest of Black Teen Parents





Top Four Types of Mistreatment During Childbirth by Health Care Providers

- 1. Being shouted at or scolding
- 2. Ignoring women, refusing their request for help, or failing to respond to requests for help in a reasonable amount of time
- 3. Violation of physical privacy
- Threatening to withhold treatment or forcing them to accept treatment they did not want

How OKBEI is Addressing Systemic Maternal Health Issues

Community-Based Doula Program

The Community-Based Doula Program begins early in pregnancy through home visits and center-based activities, a community-based doula supports families throughout pregnancy, during the birth and then into the postpartum period.

The effectiveness of the program emerges out of the trusting relationship between the community-based doula and the participant, the duration of the relationship, and the continuous presence of the doula during labor and birth.



Doulas Provide Educational, Emotional, and Physical Support

All doulas provide:

- Continuous presence during labor and delivery
- Comfort measures
- Amplify the voice of the client
- Childbirth and breastfeeding education


Doulas **do not** perform clinical tasks or give medical advice.



Doulas Benefit the Entire Family

- Less likely to have a baby with low birth weight
- 2X less likely to have complication
- Reduced perinatal mood and anxiety disorders
- Higher breastfeeding rates at 6 weeks
- Increased satisfaction with birth experience

Community-Based Doula Training







Community-Based Doula Training

Co-developed with SisterWeb as both Training-of-Trainers and module-based curriculum adaptable to different audiences.

20-Session program (60 contact hours) that includes training on:

- Communication techniques
- Attitudes, beliefs, & values
- Emotional & physical labor support techniques
- Providing culturally congruent care



Path to Certification

What is required for training graduation?

- 90% attendance
- Class participation
- Complete homework assignments

What is required for certification?

- Graduate training
- 3 prenatal visits
- 3 births supported or observed
- 3 postpartum visits
- 1 introductory breastfeeding class
- 1 introductory childbirth class
- Write & submit all visits/observations




Enhancing Access & Visibility in Our Community

In the unfortunate birthplace of the 1921 Tulsa Race Massacre, Queens Village Tulsa has approached this work strategically by amplifying the voice of Black women in the community, allowing their voices to guide the programming and services we provide.

Our Vision

Expansion is underway for Queens Village Tulsa as we prepare to launch our very first Queens Corner in the North Tulsa Health Department. This will allow us to reach the 5,146 Black women of childbearing age who come through this location.





Birth Equity by the Numbers

Despite increasing national and local attention and efforts to address the maternal health crisis, severe disparities remain between women of color, particularly Black women, and their white counterparts for outcomes and treatment in birth.



Maternal Deaths by Ethnicity

In OK, there were 67.5 maternal deaths for Black women and 59.8 maternal deaths for Native women per 100K live births compared to 21.2 for white women, reported by the Maternal Mortality Review Committee in 2023.

Program Overview

- Six weeks, 24 hours total
 - Available in English and Spanish
 - Virtual and in-person
 - One-on-one coaching and case management
- Women and teens who are pregnant or recently postpartum. In addition to their baby, many have older children (65%). Not just for first time moms!
- WithinMyReach curriculum focuses on building healthy relationships with all the people in your life: romantic, familial, professional, and relationships with your kids!
- Support for attendance
 - On-site childcare, transportation, a healthy meal, direct client assistance

Research Outcomes

Four published papers and two reports from a large randomized controlled trial of MotherWise demonstrate that the program:

- Reduces preterm birth 55%
- Improves baby's birth weight

Long-term, the program reduces:

- Maternal depression
- Conflict with the baby's father
- Participants' ratings of whether violence is acceptable in relationships
- The number of relationship transitions (family instability) a baby experiences before age 3

Additionally, MotherWise makes it more likely a mother attends her 6-week postpartum checkup and that she is on a long-acting contraceptive by then.

Lastly, those assigned to MotherWise were less likely to have an unintended pregnancy in the year following enrollment.

 - Perinatal and pediatric care
 - Food assistance
 - WIC, SNAP, TANF
 - Housing
 - On-site dental clinic
 - Immigration
- Postpartum depression prevention groups
- Long-term mental health care
 - Adult, child, couple, and family
